

DISCRIMINATIONS. The Commissioners in their decision January 1st appear to have prejudge the railroad rates throughout the State for the first seventy miles west of the Missouri line. The Eastern part of the State, by the census of 1880, contains 447, 692 population out of a total population of 996,096 fer the entire state, and it furnishes much more than one-half of the railroad traffic of the State. The Commissioners state that in this seventy mile belt the rates are, in the main, fair, but that relatively, the rates for the other 340 miles of the State are too high, expressly basing their judgment, not upon the conditions which surround the traffic in Kansas but those which prevail in Illinois. Thus while our rates are not advanced on their face they are relatively advanced in their effect on our industries compared with the western rates to and from the east line of the State. Evervone knows that on roads of the first

class in Illinois population and railroad traffic is in the main uniform and evenly distributed compared with the eastern and western part of Kansas. If the western part of our State was anywhere nearly as densely populated as eastern, there would be more justice in fixing the relation which these "local tariff rates" sustain to each other by the relation which exists on the great lines in Illinois, which from end to end run through old settled and densely popu-

We regret that the entire structure which the Commissioners have commenced to erect is based upon this faulty foundation, as we believe, if opportunity had been had, it could have been shown that the various east and west trunk lines of the State, in establishing the relation of these rates, were governed by the volume of business, the cost of handling and other sound laws of transporta-

The theory upon which our railroads have established their rates and applied specials and concessions is the one so well known to the science of transportation that the burden should be so imposed as to rest most heavily where it will be least felt, and that the town, man or class shipping every day, over a given route, in large quantities and on a nar-row margin of profit, has a right on every principal of economy and equity, to buy transportation at wholesale rates. and to such a town or class with the large amount of goods to be sold and shipped in order to make even a slender profit the concession is of vital moment. resulting in success of failure; whereas it is of comparatively little consequence what is charged, within reasonable limits, to one who ships rarely and whose business or existence does not depend

upon the difference between a regular and a special rate. But there appears to be a well-ground-ed belief on the part of the railroads taken jurisdiction of the business of the road by applying schedules, thereafter if the road uses the power which, possibly, was granted in section 10 it certainly does so at its peril, subject in all cases to appeal to a jury selected in any commu-nity that may deem itself aggrieved as provided in section nineteen, and that the result would be that all concessions, however just and fair under the circumstances, would be enforced on the entire traffic, and in the end the jury box at ev-ery railroad siding would become a Traffic Manager of the road and each only interested in forcing down its own rates.

Even the Commissioners could not protect the road from such a result, as they only direct suits to enforce penalties under section twenty, and not to re-cover damages for alleged unjust charges under section nineteen. It is not probable that the Legislature

foresaw the effects of this patchwork law hastily thrown together in conference committee at the close of the session and from many sources, but had Kansas City been given a carte blanche she could not well have framed a law more We have carefully studied this subject
