THE Catholic Church welcomes THE Catholic Church welcomes truth wherever it may be found, in history, in Biblical re-search, in psychology, in natural science, in social science, in every science, in social science, in every field of human inquiry. As the custodian of the religious truths revealed by Christ, she knows that all vertites will harmonize, because they all proceed from the same fountain of truth, God Himself. "Religion," declared Pope Pius X, "has no fear of science. Christianity does not tremble before discussion but before ignorance."

That there is no conflict has been proven time and again by scientists, both Catholic and non-Catholic, who rank among the leaders in their respective fields of research. An instance of this truth is had in a book just published by Arthur Compton, famous physicist. Mr. Compton says that newer discoveries of atomic physics support rather than disprove the basic ideas of religion. The book, "The Freedom of Man," received the following mention in the Literary Digest for November 9:

LYERY age has placed its hopes
In youth, and every age has
found in youth grave problems. In
our day we may be more hopeful

Parents stand next to God in
giving life to their children and in
directing that life. Parents need
the Church, divinely established to

state, divinely authorized to help

their children. It is the duty of
both Church and State to safeguard their rights, not to take

To educate children, to provide for their recreation and to afford relief for many groups of children are considered normal functions of the State. Even the work of children, however incidental, until they have completed their seventeenth year, according to the misnamed Child Labor Amendment, can be controlled absolutely by the Federal Government. It is assumed by an ever-increasing number that parents have only those rights of the missing the state of the state have the state have one father and mother, properly discharging their duty, can be lawfully deprived of their God-given right to educate their children. The very right by which they have given life to their child gives them control over its state has the duty of insisting

child gives them control over its education.

In matters of education the State has the duty of insisting that children shall be trained in those subjects that pertain to good citizenship. The Church has the supreme right to insist that youth shall be given that spiritual formation which will lead them to God and to eternal life. While both Church and State help in the education of youth, parents cannot in conscience surrender their rights nor divest themselves of their solicemn responsibility. Parents should be as deeply interested in providing mental food for their children as they are in supplying the nourishment that sustains their bodies.
